DPW staff contacted Marin EMS Agency staff who provided the following summary:

Several years ago EMS shortened the amount of information that is required to be given to the hospitals about the patient for what is called "patient report". The EMS Techs still have a longer transmission if they do a physician consult (which isn't used as often) but that information needs to be detail oriented.

- Each 911 patient transport requires a radio report to the receiving facility; there is an average of 32 transports per day.
- Private ambulances perform very few 911 transports but do use the radio for notifying the hospitals of those non-911 patients that get delivered to the ED.

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- There are also some non-transport situations that result in a hospital contact but they don't have numbers for those rare occurrences.
- The EMS channel is being used appropriately for its designed purpose, conversations with the hospitals

At the June 4, 2014 MERA Ops this request was agendized for discussion. Following is a summary of the feedback provided:

- EMS uses the system about 15 hours a month, a small percentage of total use of about 750 to 800 hours.
- Patient communications are essential mutual aid
- Communications are concise
- The current training program is adequate

Based on the above review, we feel there is no need at this time to make any changes regarding EMS usage of MERA. We recommend that the Executive Board concur with this recommendation.
